

FLOORING TERMINOLOGY

Identify and Label Key Floor Components



Aim:

Aim of the Activity

To develop students' understanding of floor construction by identifying and labelling key components using a 3D visual model and a corresponding worksheet diagram.

Learning Objective

By the end of the activity, students will be able to:

- Recognize and name the main parts of a typical floor structure.
- Accurately label a diagram of a floor using visual cues from a 3D model.
- Explain the function of each component in basic terms.

Activity Overview

Students will observe a 3D digital or physical model of a floor structure, examining its components such as joists, noggins, wall plates, floorboards, and insulation. Using a blank worksheet diagram, they will label each part based on what they see in the model. This activity encourages spatial awareness, technical vocabulary, and visual-to-diagram translation — essential skills in construction education

Why This Activity Helps Learning

- **Visual reinforcement:** Seeing the 3D model helps students understand spatial relationships and component placement.
- **Active recall:** Labelling from memory strengthens retention of terminology.
- **Dual coding:** Combines visual and verbal learning, improving comprehension.
- **Real-world relevance:** Mirrors how tradespeople interpret plans and structures on site.

Instructions for Students

1. Examine the 3D model of the floor structure carefully.
2. Identify each visible component — think about what it's called and what it does.
3. Use the blank worksheet diagram provided.
4. Label each part of the diagram using the correct terminology.
5. If unsure, refer to your notes or ask a peer.
6. Once complete, write a short sentence explaining the purpose of two components.

Scaffolding Strategy

- **Step 1:** Begin with a whole-class walkthrough of the 3D model, naming each part aloud.
- **Step 2:** Provide a labelled version of the diagram for reference (for lower-level learners).
- **Step 3:** Use colour-coded hints or arrows on the worksheet to guide attention.
- **Step 4:** Offer a glossary of terms with simple definitions.
- **Step 5:** Encourage peer discussion before labelling independently.

Differentiation Strategies

For emerging learners:

- Provide a word bank with definitions.
- Allow collaborative labelling in pairs.
- Use simplified diagrams with fewer components.

For advanced learners:

- Challenge them to label without prompts.
- Ask them to annotate the diagram with functions of each part.
- Extend with a task: sketch a floor section from memory.

Assessment Opportunities

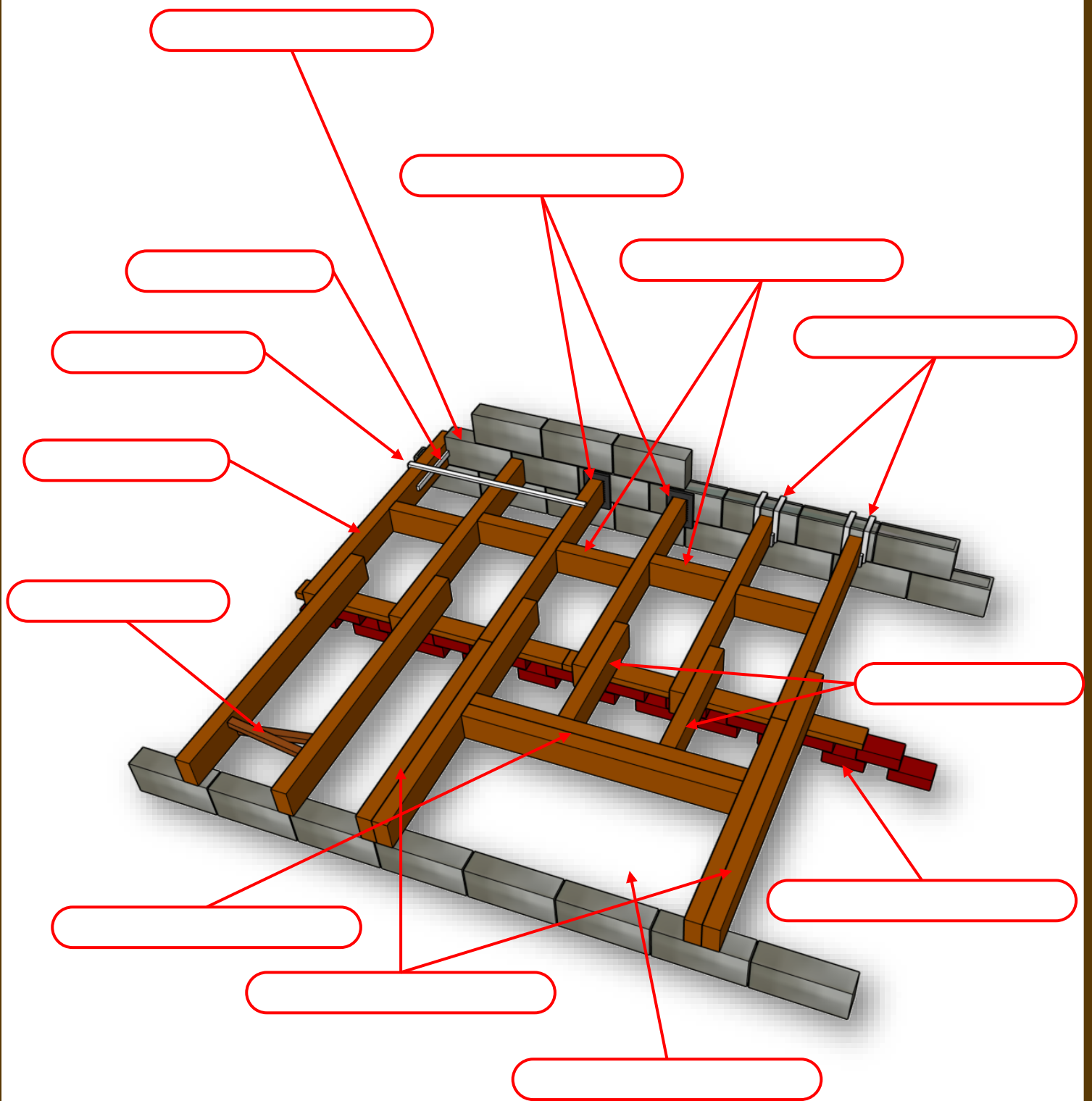
Formative:

- Observe students during the task for correct identification and terminology use.
- Use questioning to probe understanding (“What does the joist do?”).

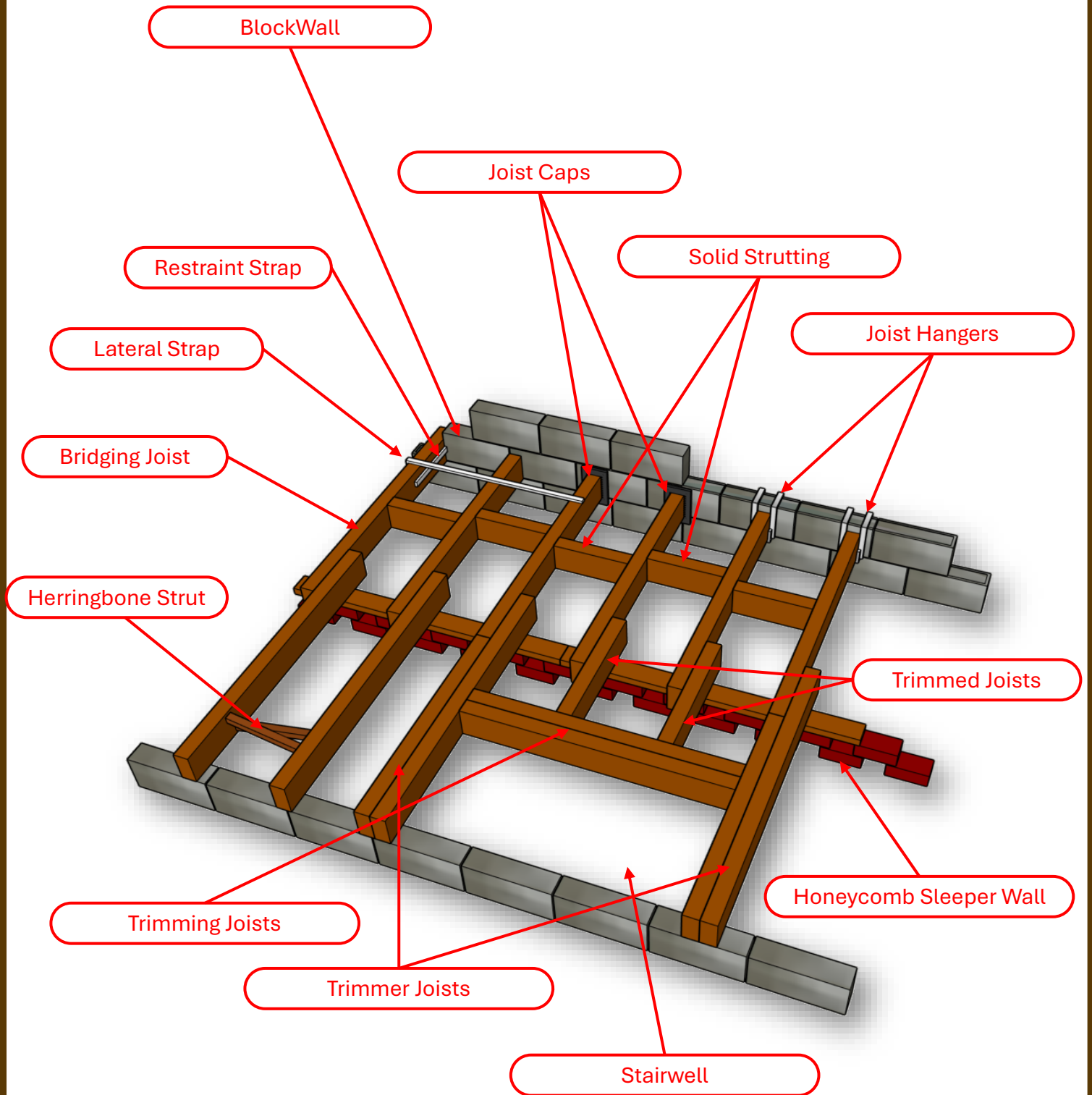
Summative:

- Collect and mark the labelled diagrams.
- Assess accuracy, spelling, and completeness.
- Optional: short written reflection or verbal explanation of one component’s role.
